In 2007, Superintendent of ACPS, Dr. John Walker, established a Diversity Council comprised of community members, students, administrators and school board members to address diversity and the multicultural aspects of our school system.

In 2008, Dr. Ratliff, Superintendent of ACPS and endorsed by the Amherst County School Board, continued this project with the creation of the ACPS Diversity Council to develop a framework of equity for all students. Dr. Ratliff's vision is "not about equalizing outcomes, but equalizing the opportunities for all students to succeed".

Parents, community leaders, students, teachers and school staff serve on the council. Training was provided by the Stillwater Institute of Social Justice.
