At the end of the session, participants will have an opportunity to select performance tasks from the VaSCL Task Bank or use locally developed alternative assessments of their own to pilot during the first semester. Participants will be invited to a follow-up "Office Hours" session, on January 25, 2021, during which they can share their feedback and examples of student work, as well as discuss their experiences with integrating performance tasks into their instruction.

Session 3 (Oct. 6): Remote Instruction Grading Challenges: What Principles Apply, and How Do We Minimize Cheating and Plagiarism?

Location: Online

Description: The principles of accurate, ethical grading don't end with the movement to remote instruction. Given our diverse opinions about modern grading practices, however, as well as the inequities among our students' situations while learning from home, our schools need to take a breath and consider what all this means for grading in the full year ahead. Join us for a candid look at which principles and practices transfer to remote instruction situations: What can we keep and where do we need to compromise? What do experts advise? What mistakes do we need to avoid? From what resources can we draw to resolve issues as they arise? Just as unsettling, too: Students learning at home have amplified teachers' concerns about cheating, plagiarizing, and parent over-assistance.
