A Message from Dr. Wells

It is hard to believe that we are already at the end of November. I trust everyone had a relaxing and enjoyable Thanksgiving holiday and you were able to spend some quality time with family and friends. As we move into December, we are ten school days away from the Christmas Holiday break. This also means you only have 24 days to take care of all of your shopping for the holiday.

The Town of Amherst is hosting the annual Christmas parade this evening at 6:30 PM on Main Street in Amherst. Mayor Tuggle and yours truly will be serving as the masters of ceremony for the parade. We should have decent weather as the rain is forecast to push out of the area by the start of the parade. I encourage you to #Show Up and support your community at the parade tonight.

ACHS will be hosting Winterfest on December 4 and 5, 2023 from 5:00 to 7:00 PM both nights. There will also be a band concert on Monday December 4 at 7:00 PM and a Choral concert on Tuesday December 5 at 7:00. Winterfest is open to all students in the county and the activities are focused around our younger students. I encourage you to try and attend Winterfest one or both nights and stay around for the concerts that will follow.

As we move closer to the colder days of the year and better opportunities for winter weather, I wanted to remind everyone of the school closure codes we will be using as well as the process we use to determine a school closure or two-hour delay. When we have forecast that is calling for winter precipitation our snow team (Dr. Wells, Dr. Hoden, Mr. Roakes and Mrs. Campbell) begins discussions on how we will monitor road conditions. If a storm is imminent or precipitation is falling, we begin checking roads around 4:00 AM. Our goal is to make a decision by 5:30 AM so we can notify families and personnel in a timely manner. However, sometimes Mother Nature does not cooperate with our timeline and we have to make judgement calls based on the forecast. We will err on the side of caution as much as possible when we believe a storm is imminent.

Once a storm has passed, we begin snow clearing operations as soon as it safe to do so. Our first priority is clear parking lots and sidewalks to

Our first priority is clear parking lots and sidewalks to ensure that staff and students have safe access to the buildings. At the same time, we begin checking area roads to determine if they are clear for travel. Our goal is to make a decision by 4:00 PM so we can alert families and staff of any changes to our operational schedule.

It is important to realize the size and elevations changes in the county. There are times when some areas of the county will be experiencing winter weather while other areas are not. We have to take into account all of the roads in the county and if we have areas of the county that are not deemed safe for travel we will opt to alter our operational schedule. When a decision has been made to alter our normal operational schedule, ACPS will utilize our social media channels, School Messenger, school email, and local broadcast stations. We will make every effort to notify staff and families in a timely manner.

ACPS has four basic options when we determine the need to alter our operational schedule:

- I. Two Hour Delay ACPS will operate on a two-hour delay. Staff and students should report two hours after their normal report time.

 Essential personnel (grounds, maintenance, custodians, building administration) should report on time.
- 2. Closed Code I Students, Teachers, teacher assistants, child nutrition workers, bus drivers, and bus aides, do not report. All I2 month and Il month administrative employees should report as usual or as soon as they can. Those who do not report are required to utilize a day of leave.
- 3. Closed Code 2 The school division is closed to staff and students. The following personnel are expected to report. Those who do not report are required to utilize a day of leave.
 - a. Division Level Administration Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, Supervisors, Directors, and the CFO.
 - b. Building Level Administrators All principals and assistant principals.
 - c. Designated Emergency Personnel maintenance, mechanics, grounds, and custodians.
 - 4. Closed Code 3 All schools and administrative offices are closed. Principals and Supervisors will contact emergency personnel to discuss reporting.

However, there may be some times when we opt for a remote learning day. The decision to utilize a remote learning day will be situational and event dependent. We will do our best to notify staff in a timely manner if we anticipate the need to utilize a remote learning day.

As we approach the holiday break, I ask you to remain focused on providing quality instruction and a safe and supportive learning environments for our students. Also remember that this is the time of year to give to those who are less fortunate and offer thanks for all that we have been fortunate enough to receive. Thank you for you all do for our students and the greater Amherst Community.





Remote Learning Day Information

As we are in the midst of winter months, and weather can be problematic, we would like to remind you that it is our intention to provide instructional opportunities to all students even in the event that they are not required to report to school. If deemed appropriate, ACPS will call for a Remote Learning Day due to weather instead of closing schools. This means that all teachers and students would be required to participate in instruction while at home.

If a Remote Learning Day is called, your school principal will send out an email providing you with instructions based on the requirements for the day. This can either be staying at home and offering students a module of work on their Canvas or Google Classrooms using your school provided laptop or coming into the school building and logging into a virtual classroom using a Google Meet link you have provided to your students.

Please ensure that you take home your laptop or school issued device each day in order to be prepared for any Remote Learning Days. All staff are to participate in the workday whether you are contracted as a teacher, IA, or classified employee. If you have questions please reach out to your school principal for additional information so that you are clear regarding the expectations and responsibilities you have for that day.

Prepare for your next appointment

Going to the doctor is an important part of staying healthy. Whether you're going for a regular checkup or seeing the doctor because you're sick, preparing for your appointment can help ensure you get the help and information you need and feel confident about your care plan moving forward.



Before your visit

Whether you're having an in-person or virtual visit, experiencing symptoms, or completing an annual physical, it helps your appointment run smoothly if you do the following things beforehand:

Make a list of everything you take. This can include prescriptions, over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Be sure to include how much you take each day.

Think about including a family member or friend. They can help you think of questions for your doctor, review information with you after your appointment, or maybe even participate in a virtual visit.

Write down questions you want to ask your doctor. You can include questions like:

- What can I do to prevent or delay health problems?
- Should I make any changes to improve my health?
- Are there tests or screenings I should have, based on my age or other risk factors?
- Do I need to come back for another visit?

Preventive care vs. diagnostic care

Preventive care can be scheduled when you're feeling well to help keep your health on track. Annual physicals and preventive screenings can help detect health problems early. Plus, they're covered by your health plan.

Diagnostic care is used to determine the cause of any symptoms you're experiencing. This type of care may include appointments with your doctor and tests used to diagnose an issue so it can be treated.



Understanding a diagnosis

If you go to the doctor for diagnostic care, make sure you understand your condition and your doctor's plan of care before leaving. Asking your doctor the following questions may help you better understand your diagnosis:1

What's the name of the condition?

What may have caused this condition?

How long is this condition expected to last?

How will this problem affect me long-term?

How can this issue be treated or managed?

Where can I learn more about this condition?



Don't leave until you feel confident

If your appointment is ending and you're still unsure about your condition

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what you're supposed to do next, don't leave without knowing the these questions:2

- 1. What is the main issue?
- 2. What do I need to do?
- 3. Why is it important that I do this?

It's important that you understand what's happening so you can feel confident in how to move forward.


